**ST. DOMINIC'S FEAST DAY NEWSLETTER 2023**

The Year 2023 started off auspiciously with the inauguration of the Jubilee of St. Thomas that will last from January 28<sup>th</sup>, 2023 to January 28<sup>th</sup>, 2025. The Jubilee consists of three anniversaries: the 700<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of his canonization (July 18<sup>th</sup>, 2023), the 750<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of his death (March 7<sup>th</sup>, 2024) and the 800<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of his birth (2025). His wisdom, eloquence, devotion, angelic purity and saintly example continue to profoundly influence the Church in our day, and we are filled with happiness to honor and celebrate him as one of our own. The Eucharistic Adoration hymns he lovingly composed are still used in the Sacred Liturgy. Our Master General, Fr. Gerard Francisco Timoner, III, O.P., has highlighted the role of St. Thomas as our preeminent teacher and reminded us of the profound letter on St. Thomas by Pope St. Paul VI: "Grace does not diminish nature, but brings it fulfillment, while nature is subordinate to grace, reason to faith and human love to divine charity."



In February we elected our new prioress for the next three years, Mother Mary of the Sacred Heart, O.P. We are grateful to her for accepting this office and for the joy, generosity, creativity and energy she has put into learning all the ins and outs of being in charge of everything! As all the Sisters have been reassigned to new charges, we also are learning to adjust and grow in grace as we continue our journey together. May Our Lady continue to be with our community as we seek to always be her Guards of Honor.

We decided it was time to say good bye to our magnificent hybrid American Elm tree, which grew in the cloister garth. The graceful vase-shaped tree had provided needed shade for almost forty years, and although still lovely to look at, it was obviously rotting away inside. Of course, taking a 30-foot tree out of the cloister garden posed a serious logistical problem, but the tree removal man soon had it solved. With his truck's large boom working from outside the garth on the other side of the novitiate wing, his crew were able to remove all the large branches safely. Father entered the Choir holding the large Monstrance, accompanied by the Sisters carrying acolyte sticks, the processional cross and censor. We made our way outside the building around to the cloister gate, which was open, and where there was a small altar set up for Benediction. The people from our chapel had gathered outside the gate and when Jesus in the Monstrance approached they all fell on their knees in loving adoration. After Benediction the laymen took the acolyte sticks, cross and censor to continue accompanying the Blessed Sacrament up the steep hill and back into the chapel. *Adoremus in Aeternum Sanctissimum Sacramentum!*
